From Jamie Yuen-Shore, Co-Creator and Co-director of I, Too, Sing America: The Next Gen

San Francisco means so much to me and to many of the artists in the show who were born and raised here, or who call this place their home. "Art isn't easy," and it especially isn't easy to produce art in San Francisco today. Yet, there are incredible people whose work and dedication to the San Francisco Bay Area arts have created an arts ecosystem. Emily Keeler, Rodney Jackson, Jr., laura elaine ellis, Othello Jefferson, Diane Price, Nicola Bosco-Alvarez these incredible people move mountains to make the arts possible here. They create connections, inspire and showcase artists, teach their craft, care for people, and find ways to make things possible. Rodney (the Co-Founder and Artistic Director of SFBATCO) and I have grown up in this community. We met in 2000 when we were in third grade at SFArtsED Summer camp. We were lucky to be the first generation of SFArtsED Players, trained by Emily Keeler, Danny Duncan, Camille Olivier-Salmon, laura elaine ellis, and many other incredible professional artists. We then went on to continue training together through high school at Rec and Parks' Young People's Teen Musical Theater Company, where we were music directed by Othello Jefferson, the creator and composer of I, Too, Sing America.

When Rodney and Marcelo Pereira founded SFBATCO, they built upon this fertile artistic foundation that had raised us. Many artists who work with SFBATCO have also been raised by SFArtsED. I learned from a young age that shared respect for your collaborators and for the craft is what makes artistic magic. *I, Too, Sing America*'s original creation followed in the spirit of building and growing in an arts community. The original company collaborated to produce choreography and storytelling that was specific to their experiences. That show created strong bonds, and many of the artists who have worked on *I, Too, Sing America* have continued to perform with this show and work on other SFBATCO productions. *I, Too, Sing America: The Next Gen* is a testament to this artistic ecosystem - to the web of arts professionals raising and training the young artists with whom we will get to collaborate.

From Rodney Earl Jackson, Jr., Co-Director of *I, Too, Sing America: The Next Gen* & SFBATCO Co-Founder and Artistic Director

I grew up as a young aspiring performing artist who gathered all I could from SFArtsED. This training program was different. Yes, I learned and dove deep into the classic repertoire of musical theatre, but I and my fellow SFArtsED Players also had the incredible honor and privilege to perform in original musicals written by the great Danny Duncan and Randy Craig.

SFArtsED's foundation absolutely thrusted a sense of ownership and creation into many of their young emerging artsists, many of whom later founded and now manage SFBATCO: a 9-year-old non-profit theatre company that engages artists and audiences through live theatre productions, creative development, and community service initiatives that resonate with SF Bay Area perspectives.

The organization provides a platform for People of the Global Majority, and inspires both new audiences and theatre innovators. *I, Too, Sing America: The Next Gen* is a full-circle moment for Jamie Yuen-Shore, Adam Maggio, and me. We were those SFArtsED kids, and now we have the honor to bring something we've created back to the

organization that gave us our start. Here's to the Next Generation!"



From Emily Keeer, SFArtsED Artistic Director

Welcome to our performance of *I, Too Sing America: The Next Gen*, the culmination of a three-week collaboration between our two companies, San Francisco Arts Education Project (SFArtsED) and the San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Company (BATCO). This multi-award-winning work, now in its fourth iteration, was originally created by Othello Jefferson and Jamie Yuen-Shore for BATCO and celebrates poetry with roots in the many cultures of American people through song, dance, and theater.

Watching a rehearsal of the opening of this work a week ago, humming with the 28 years of history in the room (the two directors, Jamie and Rodney Earl Jackson, Jr., were both in our first Broadway Bound summer camp, as well as the first Players company) with the 40 current campers, the 12 Players alums, many SFArtsED mentors (notably laura elaine ellis, Leilani Neal, Nasha Harris Santiago and Noah Bossert) with the SFBATCO company members, reminded me of the quote from *The Tempest*: "What's past is prologue." Our past work with so many in the room had set the stage for now. And. We were certainly in the midst of setting the stage for the future of many other young performers.

The process of creating this iteration of *I, Too Sing America* for our Broadway Bound students, alumni, and the SFBATCO performers celebrates what we do at SFArtsED – in our classroom and after-school programs, in our Players musical theater company, in our gallery at Minnesota Street Project, and in our summer programs. For 54 years we have brought distinguished artists into young people's lives, often welcoming them back to mentor, to share their work, and to continue participating in the culture of our city.

In the summer of 2010 at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, we produced our first "alumni show." It began with an idea from musical director Henry Shin to semi-stage *Carousel*, and invite older, still-performing alumni from our musical theater company to perform the leads with our campers in Broadway Bound.



Thrillingly, we collaborated with the full UC Berkeley Summer Symphony, for which Henry served as conductor. (That first show featured both directors for this show, Rodney and Jamie!) We continued with this extraordinary process for many years, semi-staging many classics of the musical theater and then in 2017 when SFBATCO had been established, we collaborated with them to produce a stunning version of *Ragtime* at what is now the Sydney Goldstein Theater. Our second summer collaboration with them was in 2019, which also included participation of Recreation and Parks' Young People's Teen Musical Theater Company. It was the stunning *West Side Story*, again with the Berkeley Summer Symphony and was performed for a packed house at the Palace of Fine Arts.

Since then, we have not had another full alumni show, nor a collaboration with SFBATCO given the interruption of COVID. But the tradition has been taken up. We are once again in one another's company as artists, as mentors, as students, as a San Francisco artistic family. And we welcome you, our audience, to make this process complete.

Both of our companies thank Peggy Haas and her theater family at the Presidio for welcoming us and co-producing this evening's performance. Her generosity and the Presidio's phenomenal staff have made a world of difference to our work and our ability to share it.

ARTIST BIOS

Emily Keeler has worked primarily in the Bay Area as a dancer, choreographer, educator, and advocate since 1975. She was both a dancer and resident choreographer for the San Francisco Moving Company for eight years and a principal dancer for Cliff Keuter's New Dance Company and Joe Goode Performance Group. Emily has choreographed for numerous companies, both modern and ballet, including Joffrey Dancers, Oakland Ballet, and DanceArt and has been a movement consultant and choreographer for American Conservatory Theater, Magic Theater, George Coates Performance Works, Pickle Family Circus, Make*a*Circus, Z Space, the Dance Generators, and Choral Chameleon. Emily has been a resident artist and lecturer at DeAnza College, Mills College, San Francisco State, NYU Musical Theater Graduate Writing Program, and at the Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts. She is the recipient of four National Endowment for the Arts Choreographic Fellowships and has been a judge at both the Colorado Dance Festival and the American College Dance Festival. She served for three years as the dance member of the San Francisco Arts Commission. In 2016 she was awarded an MFA from San Francisco State in Creative Writing. She has been the Artistic Director of SFArtsED since 1985, a collaborating artist and producer for the Players since 2001, and one of the curators at SFArtsED's gallery at Minnesota Street Project since 2016. Emily is workshopping with actor Andrea Snow, director Jael Weisman and composer Randy Craig, a theatrical version of her second book, Dark Days and a Black Dog. She respectfully thanks her teachers Roberta Humphrey, John Wilson, Aaron Osborne, Margaret Jenkins, Elina Mooney, Alonzo King, Yehuda Maor, Kahz Zamuda, John Lasky, and Cooley Windsor.

Jamie Yuen-Shore is a proud founding company member of SFBATCO. Born and raised in San Francisco, she trained with the San Francisco Arts Education Project (SFArtsED) and the Young People's Teen Musical Theater Company (YPTMTC). She currently works with SFArtsED as a choreographer and has been the Theater Director at Jewish Community High School for the last two years. She co-created and directed *I, Too, Sing America* in 2018 and 2019 (TBA award for Outstanding Direction of a Musical, Outstanding Production of a Musical) and is honored to continue collaborating on *I, Too, Sing America* with SFArtsED and SFBATCO - her two artsitic homes and families.

Rodney Earl Jackson, Jr. (he/him) is the Artistic Director and Co-Founder of SFBATCO. He made his Broadway debut in *The Book of Mormon* and was last seen at American Conservatory Theater & Arena

Stage in their co-production of *Toni Stone*. Prior to that he traveled North America in the first national tour of *Motown: The Musical*. Rodney is a San Francisco native who built his love and foundation for art and theatre in public city organizations such as SFArtsED, San Francisco Recreation and Park's Young People's Teen Musical Theater Company, and the Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts, where he graduated from the theatre department. He holds a BFA from Carnegie Mellon University's School of Drama. Other theatre credits: Berkeley Repertory's *Ain't Too Proud: The Life and Times of the Temptations*, San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Company's *I, Too, Sing America*. Othello Jefferson, a native of San Francisco, holds a Bachelor of Music in Voice from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and a Single Subject Music Credential from San Francisco State University. He is the Chorus and Orchestra Director at Redwood City's Sequoia High School and Minister of Music for the First African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in San Francisco. He conceived, provided original compositions for, and music directed the multi-Theater Bay Area Award-winning musical I, Too, Sing America, which honors the perspectives and experiences of American artists of color with poetry, song, music, and movement, featuring a diverse cast of singers, actors, poets, and performers (presented and produced by the San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Company). Other awards include a Gospel Music Award from San Francisco's Academy of Gospel and a Negro Spirituals Heritage Keepers Award from the Friends of Negro Spirituals in Oakland, and has completed the first level of the American Guild of Organist's examinations for professional certification (Service Playing Certificate).

Christine Chung (she/they) is the Director of Operations & Design at SFBATCO. Christine works in a variety of creative spaces focused on breaking barriers to access, exposure, and sustainability in the arts and storytelling landscapes. She focuses her work in non-profit theatre and performing arts, documentary short films, film festivals, and experiential immersive design. Her recent affiliations include Field of Vision, IF/Then Shorts, SXSW, SFFILM, Revolutionary Love Project, and African Voices. She received a 2019 Theatre Bay Area Award for Outstanding Choreography for SFBATCO's flagship show *I, Too, Sing America*.

laura elaine ellis has served 30 years on faculty for the Theatre & Dance Dept., Cal State University, East Bay and for the Arts Dept at the Athenian School. For CSUEB, she co-directed and co-choreographed, with colleague Kimiko Guthrie, *A Chorus Line* (2003) which garnered critical



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

SFBATCO was founded in 2014 by Rodney Earl Jackson, Jr. and Marcelo Javier. Since its founding, the organization has enjoyed residencies at the African American Art and Culture Complex (AAACC) and Brava Theater Center. SFBATCO engages artists and audiences through live theatre productions, creative development, and community service initiatives that resonate with SF Bay Area perspectives. The organization provides a platform for People of the Global Majority, and inspires both new audiences and theatre innovators. sfbatco.org

SFArtsED was founded in 1968, and for more than 50 years has stayed true to its mission: to enrich the lives of children by facilitating hands-on participation in the visual and performing arts—taught by practicing artists. We do this in many ways and across a multitude of disciplines. SFArtsED supports artist residencies in an array of visual arts, dance, drama, musical theater, world rhythms, and choral expression at more than twenty public schools and in after-school programs, where we also subsidize all administrative expenses. The organization offers free monthly workshops in everything from collage to bookmaking to

cyanotype prints. At SFArtsED's summer camps, students are immersed in a wide range of expressive disciplines, with nearly 20% of campers receiving critical scholarship assistance. The SFArtsED Players musical theater troupe offers a rigorous, after-school and weekend training program for young performers (ages 9-14), culminating in a fully realized production every spring at the Presidio Theatre. Many of these talented students go on to attend Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts. Artists, singers, and dancers at the high school and college levels benefit from internship opportunities at our summer camps and school programs.
